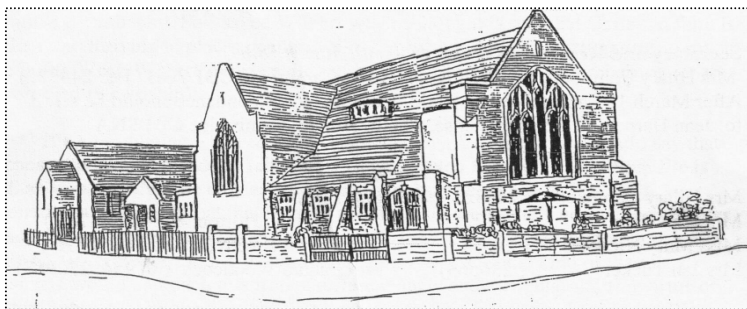

MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends,

As I write this there are various plans circulating about the celebration of the Queen's Diamond Jubilee weekend on June 2nd – 3rd and there are opportunities for churches to get involved in the festivities. Here at Emmanuel there have been discussions about the choir singing something appropriate on Sunday June 3rd and the possibility of us joining in an event organised by Cambridge churches called 'The Big

Lunch', with churches organising community lunches to bring people together.

The Diamond Jubilee raises difficult issues for the church. On the one hand there is an important theology of nationhood that can be discerned in the Bible. This recognises that nations, with their distinct cultures and identities, are part of God's ordering of the world and there is therefore an appropriate celebration of nationhood. On the other hand there has been, and still is, a tendency to over-identify God with the blood and turf of particular peoples. There are also special sensitivities in the case of a nation like Great Britain whose Empire once spanned much of the world and where there was often far too close an association between God and the Union Jack.

There is also a difficult issue with monarchy as such. However much we may admire the Queen and her distinguished service to the nation, we have to recognise a strong strand of Biblical teaching which is deeply suspicious of monarchy. Thus Israel's original request for a king was strongly resisted by Samuel and the reign of 'great' King Solomon is portrayed as a return to Egypt with all its oppression and division between haves and have-nots. Indeed it's rather ironic that the word 'jubilee' is being used in connection with a celebration of monarchy, for while monarchy is

often associated with a hierarchical ordering of society and the entrenchment of unequal distribution of wealth, jubilee has very different connotations. If we read Leviticus 25: 1-12 we find that 'the jubilee year' was part of an economic mechanism that was designed to ensure that

great disparities of wealth did not become a permanent feature of Israelite society. There was to be regular remission of debt, freeing of slaves and returning of land that had been sold back to its original owners, thus making sure that people did not get trapped in vicious circles of poverty and debt. It is highly significant that in Luke 4 Jesus took as a text for his ministry a passage from Isaiah 61 about the Jubilee. All this means that the best way to really celebrate the Jubilee would be by a massive redistribution of wealth and power in our nation, at a time when the gap is only widening between rich and poor.

So where does this leave us? After due consultation some proposals for a choir item on June 3rd have been put on hold for precisely these reasons, though there might yet be an appropriate way to recognise the occasion chorally in our service. And right now there are discussions about how we might link in with the 'Big Lunch' event, but in a way that tactfully considers the Biblical meaning of Jubilee. As you see we have agreed to have a 'Free Jubilee Cream Tea' on the afternoon of June 2nd, and we hope this will be an event open to everyone who is passing by Emmanuel. This is an event to which you can confidently invite your neighbours! Keep your eyes and ears open and do please support and join in with whatever we are doing.

Cambridge Money Advice Centre

'breaking the hold of debt'

MAC is a Christian money advice charity run from Barnwell Baptist Church. It was set up in 2005 and provides free, confidential debt and budgeting advice to anyone who needs help. The guiding principle is the belief that Jesus Christ came into the world to give us freedom, and that includes freedom from the worry of debt. They describe the range of money advice services they offer as follows:

“MAC’s volunteer advisers meet with clients to help them see what steps to take. Once a plan has been decided upon, our advisers will continue to meet with clients for as long as is needed.

We help in many different ways, from negotiating with creditors and liaising with bailiffs to helping clients through court appearances and petitioning for bankruptcy.

We also have budget ‘coaches’ who visit clients in their homes to help them to put together monthly budgets and show them how to manage their money better”.

To keep MAC running costs about £18 000 to £20 000 a year. They get no regular funding from Government or private bodies and so rely on fund-raising and donations to keep doing this very important work for the community. AREA PARTNERSHIP MEETING—26 MARCH 2012

Worship framed the beginning and end of the meeting hosted by Water Lane URC in Bishop's Stortford. The content had a "1662 flavour". What, in other words, was all the fuss about? David Thompson provided a historical context for the 350th anniversary of the Book of Common Prayer and the Great Ejection, and linked it to the study group that had brought the Church of England and the United Reformed Church into conversation from 2007-10. One result of that encounter had been a desire to heal memories and make commitments for the future, hence the service in Westminster Abbey on 7 February.

Susan Durber described the challenges of preparing a liturgy for the formal space of that building, and how considerable negotiation over hymnody and the phrasing of prayer was required, but was very appreciative of how the Archbishop of Canterbury had honoured the dissenting tradition in his sermon.* Ruth Whitehead had been asked to speak, in no more than 250 words (!) about her dual ministry in Whittlesford, where she is also priest in charge of two parishes. She discovered that although the Abbey sound system was top rate, the acoustic was very difficult, and she was taken back to her childhood, when her father had emphasised the necessity of reading s l o w l y. In her view, sharing allows us to listen for the work of the Spirit in others. Finally, Nigel Uden, whose love of music was nurtured in the Anglican tradition, spoke of his gratitude of having been in the Abbey, but sensed that issues of power and privilege remained to be addressed in denominational relations. He hoped that in any follow up service locally, a preacher from neither tradition might be invited.

Small group discussion followed, where it was helpful to hear about the experiences of URC congregations, such as St Luke's, Clavering and Whittlesford, which work side by side with Anglicans in Local Ecumenical Partnerships. We were also given the details of the service to be held at Great St Mary's at 4.30pm on Sunday 7 October.

And as usual, we shared information for circulating back in the home congregations:

M & M contributions for 2011 were acknowledged with thanks, the Synod Day on church growth, welcome, evangelism and prayer would be at Chelmsford on 16 June, the Church & Society Committee would be looking to organise a programme on how best to respond to the new austerities. Catherine Ball, as a member of Mission Council also made a statement that Lawrence Moore (nominated by Eastern Synod) had resigned as co-Moderator elect, and that the Zero Intolerance campaign had ended.

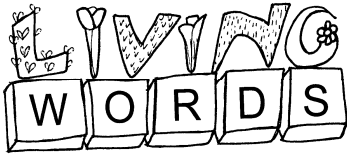

Update on Dorothy Pindeni

Dorothy sends greetings and blessings from Malawi. Since she returned to Malawi in April 2009, Dorothy has had a difficult time. Initially her suitcase was stolen with all her medicines and injections and her presents for her family. However, she was able to get back the things from her insurance. Then her house was rendered inhabitable as the roof needed mending. I was able to send her some help with this and fortunately a cousin did not charge her for his labour and with the help she received, she bought the bricks to mend the roof.

The latest news from Dorothy is that her son Trevor who has a heart problem will be finishing school in the summer. He is aged 19 and when Dorothy was in London he pined for her and he was the main reason why she returned to Malawi, apart from the fact that she was not given leave to stay in this country. Dorothy tells me that the hospital are not giving her the injections for her diabetes and she is having to manage on pills which is not nearly as satisfactory for her diabetes. The hospital, Queen Elizabeth Hospital says that she now has to collect the pills every two weeks which means that she has to pay for her travelling to the hospital. The hospital is clearly affected by the shortages in Malawi as Malawi is suffering economically as a result of the drought and the global downturn.

If the church could make a contribution towards Dorothy's travelling costs as Dorothy lives in a village which is some way from the hospital, I know that Dorothy will deeply appreciate any contribution. She attends the Roman Catholic Church and remains a committed Christian.

THE POWER OF STANDING TOGETHER A STORY FOR CHRISTIAN AID WEEK

Christian Aid Week tells the story of a community in Sierra Leone that has seen remarkable change. Tenneh Keimbay's life turned around when the Methodist Church of Sierra Leone (MCSL) started to work in her town, distributing tools and teaching farmers simple food production techniques. She talks enthusiastically about the difference this has made: 'Now the children eat two meals all year round, whereas before it was one. They are growing well; they don't cry around me because of hunger. They are happy to go to school because something is in their stomach.'

The benefits of regular food speak for themselves. But the effects of the food production group have been more wide-ranging than this. Tenneh speaks of the huge difference working in a group has made to her. Acting together, the farmers can share their skills and work more efficiently. As she tells us, the bottom line is that 'the group work provides more food'.

Tenneh speaks of the support and the encouragement that the farmers give to each other, and how much can be achieved when the community comes together. 'What inspires me in life is unity,' she says. 'To me, unity means coming together to decide on one thing and take that forward.'

Now that they are no longer limited by hunger, the people of Gbap (pronounced Bap) have come together and successfully lobbied for a new school and an agricultural work centre for the community. The people of Gbap have taken their future into their own hands.

Can we use this Christian Aid Week to allow ourselves to be changed? If we can work together, with each other, with our churches and with our neighbours both at home and as far away as Gbap, then we may start to see huge change happen.

Tenneh says that 'when you are a group and work with focus and total commitment, you work at a faster rate; the stronger ones can help with work that weaker ones cannot do by themselves'. As we engage in Christian Aid Week, we can rejoice as we stand together in solidarity. Although we might ask who is the strong and who is the weak – and who is actually giving to whom.

Be a part of Christian Aid Week this year: if, together, we take small actions we can give people like Tenneh the tools to make big change happen. Contact Annette Stuart or Maureen Kendall.
